The drug dealer noticed that necklace and asked why I wore the cross. Previously I had uttered "OH." Now a beautiful story of how much Jesus loves me came out of my mouth. It was a Gospel presentation my Concordia professors would have been proud of. Those words were not my words. The Holy Spirit used me to share the story of Jesus' love with a drug dealer. The Holy Spirit tore that wall down and we talked. The Holy Spirit taught me that there is no difference between me and a drug dealer. We have all sinned and need a Savior.

My seatmate left the bus at a college town. He shook my hand – a cold clammy handshake – but it was from the heart. He thanked me and was gone.

I will never know the impact that bus ride had on my new friend's life. I do know the impact the bus ride had on me. I now know that the Holy Spirit can use me to share the story of Jesus' love with the most unlikely people. The Holy Spirit

will give me – and all of us – the words to share the story of Jesus' love with those who so desperately need to hear.

Many of the NID LWML projects address populations who are on the fringes of society and often are dealing with unspeakable living conditions. Through our grants, we speak the healing and encouraging words of the Gospel message. One such grant, LCMS World Relief –HIV/AIDS Medical & Biblical Care in Kenya, addresses the tragic HIV/Aids pandemic in Kenya. Not only did our \$7,750 bring medical aid but also the Biblical message of the sanctity of life and marriage.

Another area that we regard as unspeakable are children with emotional and behavior disorders. Lutherbrook has continually provided a safe and residential place for these

children. Through the recent funding of our mite money, they will continue to reach out to these children to help them grow spiritually through Bible study and Christian speakers.

While as a society we aim to speak up for those with disabilities, 95% of the 12 million visually impaired people in the United States are unchurched. Our grant to the Lutheran Blind Mission for \$10,000 will supply congregations with materials and training to reach out to these people.

We still have much to do to finish reaching those in

unspeakable circumstances such as the Dhimba project of LBT where they attempt to reach out to people in Angola, a country that currently is not friendly to Christians. We also still need to fund the project to bring the Gospel to Muslims. Closer to home, we can reach the shut-ins through our support of Lutheran Media Ministries. Just as the need to speak the Gospel to the people of unspeakable circumstances never ends, so does the need to continually give our mites.


Speaking the Unspeakable

As a team of ten women of LWML, we were called to Olanchito, Honduras in November 2007 to provide a ministry to the women of the Lutheran Church. We knew that our hearts were filled with His love, but how would we SPEAK His message to those who did not know Him? How would we share the grace that is offered through His death and resurrection which is too often UNSPOKEN? Our first opportunity to SPEAK in Olanchito was in an open market, presenting the gospel through a drama based on Max Lucado's book, *You Are Special*. Men and women, and children climbing into trees, came to listen that they are special because God created them in His image. The truth of God's grace and forgiveness had been UNSPEAKABLE to these people until the Spirit opened their hearts that Sunday afternoon and they became children of God.

In our country, where the

name of God is UNSPEAKABLE in our public schools, God opened the doors for us to SPEAK His words to the young boys and girls of Olanchito in their public school. We had been given a gift by Christ to tell over 600 children how God



created this world and each of them, and how He showed His love by sending Jesus to die on the cross for our sins. God used us to SPEAK His UNSPEAKABLE message as we entered their school walls each morning for four days.

And as we led bible studies with the women and children at the church every afternoon, there were times when each of us was unable to SPEAK in

their own language. Yet, we smiled and gave God the glory as we watched how He used these useless, UNSPEAKABLE vessels to share His love. The women and children would smile and giggle too, as we tried to understand one another, but in God's language...love is love. We can SPEAK His love to the UNSPEAKABLE at any time He chooses to work through us.

Sometimes, He used our mouths and words, but more often, He used our feet to go, our hands to hug and our faces to SPEAK THE UNSPEAKABLE.



The unspeakable word came to me in a hospital when the Dr. said my husband would not come out of a coma after brain surgery. This could not be happening - I couldn't be hearing what I was hearing. But it was so and five days later, as I sat by the bed watching his heavy breathing, his eyes flew open, then closed, and he breathed no more. His soul had gone to be with his Heavenly Father - and I remained here.

After nearly 48 years of marriage, I was alone, by myself, as I had never been before. The plans that lay ahead - a plan to attend the LWML Convention in Sioux Falls, a plan to see the mountains God created - a plan to see the wonders of Alaska - a plan to move to a new house - to enjoy grandchildren and to serve the Lord together would never happen.



But other unspeakable words have come to me also. Our children have prayed and cried with me - spoken words of comfort and support - Mom, do you want to come to dinner tonight...my LWML sisters stopped on their way to Sioux Falls and prayed with me in the hospital corridor "The Lord is my Shepherd"...Friends from childhood called...a friend from church calls every day or so "just to check"... and other widows who know the path well are leading me. God led me to a grief support group, where two women who surely are the hands of God, encourage me to cry - and I excel.

Unspeakable words of comfort from God's Word have a real personal meaning for me now as they never had.

"The Lord your God is with you, he is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you, he will quiet you with his love" Zephaniah 3:17.

"For He will command his angels concerning you to guard you in all your ways." Psalm 91:11.

And finally I look forward to meeting my Savior and seeing my husband in the new heaven.
